TRAVEL LOG: Korond Pottery from Transylvania

After booking our flight to Budapest for August 2nd, I found a website about Korond Pottery, which stated that their Pottery Market is held annually on the first full weekend in August. I was delighted, because we planned to spend part of our vacation in Romania, so we arrived in the town of Korond on Saturday, August 7th. At this point, dear reader, I encourage you to "trust, but verify" all information from websites, since we discovered the actual Pottery Market was held on a later "first weekend" in August.

Korond Pottery is a beautiful Hungarian folk pottery made in Romania. You may wonder how a distinctive and traditional Hungarian product could be made in another country. The answer is quite simple. Korond is produced in Transylvania, which was part of the Kingdom of Hungary for 1000 years before being given to Romania after World War I by the Treaty of Trianon.

The town of Korond is located in Harghita County, one of the three counties that comprise the Székelyföld, or Szekler Land. The Székely (Szeklers) are a distinctive subgroup of the Hungarian people. In medieval times, the Székely were entrusted with guarding the eastern border areas of the Kingdom of Hungary. They have remained in their homeland in Erdély (Transylvania), even after the border was changed in 1920. Today, the Székelyföld is an island of ethnic Hungarians in the center of Romania.

Most Korond pottery is richly hand-painted with traditional Magyar (Hungarian) folk motifs. Various flowers, foliage and birds are most often seen, but other designs, often of a patriotic nature, can also be found. Korond is produced in many different colors. Pieces decorated in reddish brown and green are the most traditional style, but cobalt blue decoration is extremely popular, as are items with vivid red designs. Solid color pieces with carved or incised decoration in green, blue, white or black are also popular, though less traditional than the hand-painted Korond.
