EARLY AMERICAN PRESSED GLASS BREAD PLATTERS AND PLATES

with JEWELL GOWAN

Early American Pattern Glass bread plates and platters were made from the 1850's thru the 1920's. Anna Maude Stuart's book *Bread Plates and Platters (1965)* divides bread plates into two main categories: (1) Patterned and (2) Historical & Commemorative. The earliest ones were a part of the table sets (cups, saucers, plates, salt & peppers, etc.). When Sandra Millius shared her collection of bread plates, several months ago, most of hers were of those lovely patterned ones.

As time went on the fascination for these plates escalated and they appeared with religious and inspirational lettering on them. By the 1870's and beyond, it became popular to introduce one for most any famous historical event, famous person, inauguration and even industries and organization.

One of the characteristics of EAPG is stippling, which was invented at the Boston and Sandwich Glass Company to hide flaws in the glass. Bread plates were made in several shapes—round, square, oval and oblong.

Jewell showed the following examples from the first category (EAPG PATTERNED BREAD PLATES):

BAND GROUP: Clear Diagonal Band (a.k.a. California State Pattern)

DEWDROP & HOBNAIL GROUP: Dewdrop with Sheaf of Wheat, 101 with implement

FRUITS, BERRIES & GRAIN: Grapes

TREES, LEAVES & GRAINS: Sheaf of Wheat

CONVENTIONAL: Clear Ribbon (Give Us This Day Our Daily Bread); Horseshoe

ARTS & MYTHOLOGY: Cupid and Venus

ANIMALS, BIRDS & BUTTERFLIES: Beehive; Lion; Frosted Lion; Three Cranes

Jewell also showed examples of the second category (HISTORICAL & COMMEMORATIVE BREAD PLATES & PLATTERS)

EARLY AMERICAN HISTORY:

Christopher Columbus (from the 1893 Columbian Exhibition in Chicago); Constitution; Emblem (E Pluribus Unum); Independence Hall (Centennial); Signers (has signatures of the signers of the Declaration of Independence)

FAMOUS FOREIGNERS: George VI Coronation (1937); George VI & Elizabeth; Elizabeth II Coronation (1952); Sir Moses Montefiore (19th century philanthropist)

PRESIDENTS OF THE UNITED STATES: Grover Cleveland; Zachary Taylor; (If you find a president's portrait embossed on a certain blank, you will probably also find most of the other early presidents portraits embossed on the same blank)

RELIGION: Bible; Bible (Variant); Bible (Hebrew); Faith, Hope & Charity; The Last Supper; Rock of Ages

Most EAPG bread plates were made in clear glass but you occasionally see one, possibly a later one, in pastel colors (i.e. Admiral Dewey in a pale yellow). The Tiara reproduction of The Last Supper was made in clear and several colors including blue and amber.

Jewell's example of Columbus was a shade of purple. EAPG pieces may turn from clear to various shades of purple because of their manganese content. This is called "sun purpling". Sometimes it happens because the glass is accidentally exposed to the sun, and sometimes it just happens. Some dealers have been known to expose it to the sun on purpose and some cook it in an oven until it bursts or turns purple, whichever comes first. While there are some sun purple collectors, most EAPG collectors prefer their clear glass to remain uncolored.
