MID-CENTURY MODERN GLASS WITH ED MARTIN & NEAL SKIBINSKI

These companies are those most closely identified with the mid-century modern style of glassware, but even the more traditional companies such as Duncan Miller and Fostoria, and populist companies such as Jeannette and Federal, made it as well. Virtually every American container glass company in business in the 1950s and 60s hopped on the midcentury style bandwagon, while foreign companies, especially Italian and Scandinavian, contributed their share of pieces.

Mid-century modern glass is characterized by the variety of colors and shapes. The colors are mostly very bright, but there are also pieces in muted colors such as soft grays and taupes. But in order to be classified as midcentury, the shapes have to be fairly futuristic.

Blenko is probably the most well documented company. The web site theblenkoproject.org has their catalogs from 1948 forward, and lots of good information on the company.

Bischoff can be harder to identify, but there are catalog reprints on eBAY right now. There is a web site for Kanawha, Kanawhaglass.com. The Blenko Project web site has information on many of the Ohio Valley companies: http://www.blenkocollectors.com/blenkocollohiovalleyglass.htm.













FOSTORIA'S HAWAIIAN PATTERN WITH JEFF MOTSINGER

"Aloha" means hello and goodbye, as well as love and affection, so we said "aloha" to Fostoria's beautiful Hawaiian pattern, made only from 1962 to 1963, although Jeff suspects it was only in the '63 catalog because they had stock remaining. Jeff was intrigued by the colors and designs and decided somebody should collect it, so he did!

Fostoria took their cue from Murano pieces. It was made only in two colors—brown and teal on amber glass, and only three molds were used to form its various shapes. It was a dicey process trying to get the color in the mold and then another color on top of it, and it had a lot of breakage, plus sales were not great, so it was discontinued almost before it got started.

The small pitcher is from the same mold as the bowl but with a pulled spout and handle. One torte plate has a well in the center for a wooden cutting board for cheese. Jeff doesn't have this piece and would like it with or without the board.
