SUMMER CHINTZ WITH JOI SHERVEY



Joi's every-day dinnerware is Summer Chintz by Johnson Brothers of England. It was made from 1988 to 2008. It has a lovely white earthenware body with a scalloped rim and dark pink border, with a pattern of multi-colored floral sprays. Matching tablecloths, place mats, napkins and glassware were also available.

Johnson Brothers produced Summer Chintz for two decades. The firm was founded in 1883 at Charles Street Works in Hanley, Stoke-on-Trent. They continued to grow throughout the first half of the 20th Century, but by the late 1960s demand waned and the company was acquired by the Wedgwood group in 1968.


Joi bought most of her set at a company called Jafco, which was in business in Portland until the 1970s. When they closed, she bought a whole lot of it at their going out of business sale, and then Meier and Frank, and later a store at Bridgeport that carried discounted Waterford and Johnson Brothers pieces. Now she finds it on eBay.



BOUDOIR BOXES

I had no idea that there were such cool illustrations on old nonfood boxes.

The men's underwear boxes have handsome, athletic men in their underwear. I suggest this is because wives bought underwear for the family, and these hunks are very appealing. The few women's underwear boxes I have seen are very circumspect with chaste pilgrim or puritan ladies. The women's hosiery boxes are brightly colored, some with beautiful women and some with animals.


One of my more interesting boxes is for Camel underwear, featuring the camel, backdrop and logo from the cigarette package.

My collection is limited by lack of display space, price and beauty of the box. No plain, un-illustrated boxes shall darken my shelves! Some of my boxes are in worn condition. I bought them because a) when would I ever find another one and b) the price was affordable. Plus, if the illustration is wonderful, a couple of dings don't matter to me. I spend around \$15-25 per box now, but earlier in the 2000's I would go up to \$50.

I collect many types of early 20th Century non-product boxes such as glass candy jars, glass and ceramic cigarette boxes, glass powder jars, etc., as well as cardboard commercial product boxes such as food, chocolates, cosmetics and powder, crayons, pencils, games, bridge tallies, playing cards, and, of course, "Boudoir Boxes."

I coined the name "Boudoir Boxes" for those that contained products that would be used, changed in to and changed out of in the bedroom or bath. So, underwear, stockings, handkerchiefs, garters, collars, notions, etc.

What got me started on Boudoir Boxes was the gift of a Meier and Frank underwear box in the 1990s. Prior to that,















