FAVORITE FINDS OF 2014

Carole Bess White

If there is one thing PROG people do well it is SHOP SHOP! And 2014 was no exception. We had a great time shopping and an even better time showing off our finds at meetings.

Jan Baxter brought a marked 1980's Fenton blue opalescent toothpick that she found at Replacements Ltd.

Jim Cooke showed two Verlys Art Deco ashtrays in opalescent glass from the 1930's: a round one with a rose motif, and a rectangular one with a butterfly.

Diane Foster brought a Heisey Beaded Swag covered butter and pitcher that were made from 1897—1905.

Elmer Heffner brought a Fenton lamp he acquired at the Collectors Market on Columbia Blvd. The price was so reasonable he didn't even ask for a discount!

Gyrid Hyde-Towle went shopping in her storage boxes and found a ruby-flashed comport by Louis, one of the West Virginia glass companies, and an amber Cambridge Cleo mayonnaise bowl and spoon.

Jerry Linschoten brought an early 1903 Holly Amber cruet, an early 1903 Nile Green cruet, a McKee Venetian chocolate glass bonbon and a chocolate glass Cactus salt shaker body fitted with metal parts to make a mustard pot with hanging spoon; the spoon is a family piece.

Ed & Sandra Martin brought a vibrant red square vase with a round rim and four penny licks, which is what ice cream cones were served in before edible cones were invented. They are mainly English. One is a ha'penny lick, which is very shallow.

Mark Moore found a pair of Red Robin Bailey's cups. He already had 4, so these join their brothers and sisters. He also brought a pink Cherry Blossom sherbet dish.

Venita Owen-McClain brought a Paden City blue glass horse. Mosser bought the mould, but they produced them in different colors than the originals and market them with their logo. Venita's is original, old Paden City production.

Celeste Sprague brought three red pieces: a Georgian salt shaker by Hocking, a Royal Ruby sugar from the late 1940's and an Imperial red slag mug with birds with the "IG" mark from the 1960's.

Carole Bess White showed a movie magazine featuring Loretta Young, a Schrafft's chocolate box, a Kranse's chocolate box, a 1930's April Showers cologne set and a perfume atomizer with fired-on blue and black decoration. The atomizer was decorated in America.

Jean Zitzer brought a lacy Sandwich Glass opalescent cup plate and oblong tray, quite rare, original old production.

INDIANA GLASS COMPANY'S PATTERN #301 GARLAND

The pattern I collect is called Garland and was manufactured by Indiana Glass Company. My collection started with a platter that my grandmother received as a gift in the 1940's.

The founding of the Indiana facility at Dunkirk, Indiana, can be traced from 1897 when Beatty-Brady Glass Company opened a glass manufacturing company. In 1899 a group of 18 glass manufacturers merged into National Glass Company and purchased the Beatty-Brady facility.

The stock market crash of 1907 marked the bankruptcy of the National Glass Company. In 1908 Indiana Glass Company opened the reorganized facility at Dunkirk, which operated until union problems and the demise of K-Mart forced closure in November 2002.

Indiana called the Garland pattern by its number 301. It is also known as Banana Fruits. It was produced from 1935 until 1980. The pattern is very limited. There are serving pieces including plates and bowls, but there are no tumblers or goblets. And yet, there are two different baskets. The pieces are hefty; no dainty wines here!

A variety of stains were used to color the pieces, mainly darker colors and pastel colors. There are various colors of glass such as custard, and some pieces like my candlesticks have a satin finish.

The Garland pattern is easy to confuse with the Westmoreland pattern Della Robbia; however, once you see the bananas in the Garland pattern you can tell the difference right away. The Della Robbia candleholders have a solid center with a floral medallion, and the Garland candleholders have an open center.

As with all the rules in glass collecting, there is an exception—the Garland candlesticks do not have the bananas.
