BOARD OF DIRECTORS CANDIDATES

GYRID HYDE-TOWLE

My helpers and I prepare the lunch at the Rain of Glass Sale on Friday setup day, and we also prepare the clam chowder for PROG's annual Soup Feast every March. My late husband Dick and I spearheaded the campaign to establish the Children's Arboretum Park in N.E. Portland.

SANDRA MARTIN

I enjoy collecting Depression Glass, flower frogs, perfume bottles as well as ducks in all media, anything related to soda fountains, pitchers, and more with my husband Ed. About thirteen years ago, we became members of Portland's Rain of Glass, and I have worked on numerous committees and was elected Treasurer in July of 2010.

When our collecting became an obsession we realized we had to start selling at antique shows. We also conduct estate sales. We live in Milwaukie, Oregon, and look forward to traveling across country; buying and selling along the way. Who knows, maybe we will be the next TV reality show: "E & S Antique Finders."

NEAL SKIBINSKI

I am a longtime member of Rain of Glass and currently serve on the Board of Directors as Program Director. I have been the antiques and furniture appraiser for Classic Antiques, and I appraise at the Rain of Glass Show and Sale and the Glass Collectors Convention. I was a founding member of the Oregon Trail Heisey Collectors and served as Vice President of that club.

I have served on the appraisal teams at the Palmer/Wirfs Antiques & Collectibles Show, the Portland Rain of Glass Shows and Portland's Architectural Heritage Center and have been a frequent speaker at many venues including Rain of Glass events, the Salem Antique Club and the Pittock Mansion. I have co-curated glass and antique exhibitions for the opening of the Architectural Heritage Center, the Collins Gallery at the Multnomah County Library and Palmer/Wirfs Antiques & Collectibles Show.

My "official" board member term expires this year, but the board has asked me to stay on in an appointed position as Convention Director, which I am happy to do. Our appointed positions carry full voting rights on the board, and I look forward to serving for many more years.

BOARD TO PROPOSE CHANGES TO PROG'S BYLAWS

The board will be proposing changes to two sections of the Bylaws at the Annual Meeting in June. One will be a proposal to reduce the number of elected director positions from twelve to nine. The other will clarify the duties and procedures to be followed by the president.

Also to be considered will be a board recommendation that currently elected members continue on the board with all voting rights until the end of their terms. This will result in a gradual reduction in board membership over the next two years until the elected board membership conforms to the proposed change to nine elected directors.

OUR 2016 GLASS COLLECTORS CONVENTION SPEAKERS

Corning Pyroceram Cookware	Debbie and Randy Coe have written several books for Schiffer Publishing including Elegant Glass: Early, Depression and Beyond and Corning Pyroceram Cookware. They are contributing advisors to All About Glass, the magazine of the West Virginia Museum of American Glass. Locally, they write articles for Old Stuff newspaper, and they currently publish Glass Tidings, their own glass newsletter Randy is on the identification team for the Christine Palmer Antique & Collectible Shows.
	Wayne Husted began his career at the Blenko Glass Company on April 1, 1952. Every year he came up with 50 to 60 new designs for Blenko, and one of them won an award in the Corning Museum competition and was featured in their <i>Glass</i> <i>1959</i> exhibition. He is known for Blenko's huge bottles and decanters. He remained at Blenko until 1963, and then returned 36 years later in 1999. Wayne designed our 2014 convention banquet favor vase.
	PROG member Sam Kissée's collecting interests range from Boston and Sandwich to E.A.P.G. to Victorian colored glass, colored Steuben c. 1910-1930, chocolate Cactus glass, 1820-1850 Arts & Crafts copperware and much more. Sam holds a MA in Art History with an emphasis on ceramic and glass design. In 2005 he won the California State University Faculty International Development Award and studied "The Art & Architecture of the Czech Republic" at Karlovy Univerzity in Prague.
	Joann Tortarolo has been President of the Historical Glass Museum, Foundation of Redlands, California since 2013. She is a board member of California's Fostoria Glass Collectors, Inc., and is a member of Carder Steuben Glass Collectors, Southern California Heisey Collectors, American Cut Glass Association, Early American Pattern Glass Society and Duncan & Miller National Glass Society. She collects Fostoria Meadow Rose, Manor and amber/green/ebony glass of the 1920s-1940s.
