GINNY DAVID

Ginny worked for 35 years in public education at elementary and middle schools in Tigard; elementary principal in Hillsboro, and 8 years as a student teacher supervisor at Linfield College.

She has always loved collecting and researching a variety of glassware: salt cellars, especially intaglio and English hallmarked; perfume bottles, focusing on Evening in Paris; cranberry glass; depression pieces; inkwells and jewelry caskets/boxes. Non-glass groupings include Flow Blue dishware; silhouettes (couples only); Roseville Foxglove; sterling vinaignettes and Carltonware "walking" teapots and cups.

Ginny has participated as a dealer in the Rain of Glass Sale since 2003, and she became a member of PROG in 2013. She is serving as Convention Registrar for the second year.

RANDY DAVID

Randy served in the U.S. Navy and then worked for 32 years in the transportation industry as a driver throughout the contiguous United States; a dispatcher; owner of Big Red Transportation and broker.

His glass interests include Imperial Iron Cross/NuArt pieces; mustards; carnival glass; pressed glass covered compotes and art glass, especially Loetz and Moser. Other collections include Navy-related items, including vintage Popeye the Sailor!

Randy has participated as a dealer in the Rain of Glass Sale since 2003, and he became a member of PROG in 2013.

MABLE HARDEBECK

Mable worked eight years as a secretary at the AAA office in Portland and 40 years as a legal secretary at several law firms in Washington and Multnomah Counties. During that time, she was a member of the Washington County Legal Secretaries Association and held various offices in that Association.

Mable joined PROG in September of 1992 and was elected to the Board of Directors in 1994, serving two terms. In 1995 she was appointed Membership Chair, serving eight years in that capacity. She has also worked on the Show (Sale) and Convention Committees and has served as Chair of the Show Display and Nominating Committees. She currently is the Chair of the Bylaws and Policy and Procedures Committee.

Mable began collecting Heisey Crystolite in 1978. Other pieces in her collection include Pink Dogwood by MacBeth Evans, hand-blown fruits and vegetables, glass candies, console bowls with matching candleholders, pattern glass—and other glassware which strikes her fancy!

PATTERN OF THE MONTH

HOMER LAUGHLIN CO./LIFETIME CHINA "MAGNOLIA" WITH GYRID HYDE-TOWLE





The Homer Laughlin China Company became the largest china manufacturer in the United States. Not only did they make our beloved Fiesta Ware, they also made hundreds of other patterns for home, government and restaurant use.

The Laughlin Pottery was started by brothers Homer and Shakespeare Laughlin in 1871 in East Liverpool, Ohio. Shakespeare left in 1879, and Homer later sold his interest to his partner William Edwin Wells. By the 1920s the company had relocated to Newell, WVA, where it remains today. In 2010, Laughlin purchased the Hall China Company.

Eight years ago Gyrid spotted a set of Laughlin's Magnolia ware at Expo for \$20. Magnolia is a 1950s pattern with several variations and colors. She fell in love with it and just couldn't pass it up. She likes to use it with her Wm. Rogers Princess silver plate flatware, a 1928-29 pattern.

PINK DORIC WITH BARBARA COLEMAN

The Jeannette Glass Company of Jeannette, Pennsylvania, manufactured the Doric pattern from 1935 to 1938. It is known in the colors of pink, green, yellow and Delphite (a medium opaque blue). Very occasionally, according to Hazel Marie Weatherman, a piece will be found with the early trademark "J" in triangle, but otherwise the pieces are not marked.

Jeannette made a full set of tableware in the Doric pattern. There were six styles of bowls, a butter dish and cover, a cake plate, a candy dish and cover, a three-part candy in a hammered aluminum holder, a coaster, creamer, cup and saucer, sugar and lid, two styles of pitchers and three styles of tumblers. In addition, there were four sizes of plates, a platter, relish tray in two sizes, salt and pepper, footed sherbet and two styles of trays. The footed pitcher is still quite spendy, as are tumblers.

Pink is the color seen most often, with green following closely behind. Delphite and yellow are rare and not available in all pieces.

Jeannette was a pioneer in bringing automation together with colored glass to the public. According to Weatherman, as early as 1924 Jeannette is described by the trade as "one of the most complete automatic factories in the country." Jeannette was the first company to make "pink and green glass automatically in a continuous tank," according to a trade journal.

Jeannette also made a related pattern called Doric and Pansy and children's dishes called "Pretty Polly Party Dishes."

DON WIRFS, FEBRUARY 11, 1947 ~ MARCH 9, 2017

Don Wirfs, founder of the "Expo" antique and collectible shows, passed away from natural causes.

He started holding one-day flea markets in the Memorial Coliseum in 1977. In 1980 he increased to three days and moved to the Portland Expo Center.

He hired Christine Palmer in 1977, and she bought the shows from him and continues to operate them today under the name Christine Palmer and Associates.

Don is survived by his children, Taylor and Kennedy.



KENT WASHBURN, MARCH 12, 1943 ~ APRIL 7, 2017

Kent Washburn of San Antonio, Texas, passed away from injuries received in an automobile accident.

PROG members may recall that Kent was instrumental in convincing us to host the National Depression Glass Association Show, which took place in Salem, Oregon, in July of 2001.

He was a board member of N.D.G.A. and served as president from 1998 to 2010.

Kent is survived by his son and four grandchildren.
