HAVILAND'S ESTEREL PATTERN with JAN BAXTER



When Jan and Don Baxter got married in 1968, they went to Friedlander's Jewelers in Seattle to choose their china, silver and glassware patterns. They chose Esterel china by Haviland & Co.

American businessman David Haviland visited the city of Limoges in France because of rich deposits of kaolin, the ingredient necessary to manufacture porcelain. In 1840, he opened the Haviland & Co. factory in Limoges, and by 1842 he was shipping porcelain to America.

Haviland had sons and grandsons who have kept the business going, and there are more than 30,000 Haviland designs in existence.

Jan's Esterel pieces say "Made in France." She has the basic service for eight, some of which she found at Replacements Ltd. She uses family serving pieces in place of Esterel serving pieces. Her stemware is Baccarat Longchamps.

To Jan, Esterel evokes the memory of being a young couple and picking a pattern and treasuring it all these years.

Marty Linschoten—McKee Heart Band souvenir pitcher, European vase; **Trish Reading**—cranberry British piece with shell-shaped feet; cased glass powder box probably by Central, European Moserstyle Bohemian piece, spatter art glass toothpick holder probably Italian, Delaware toothpick holder with traces of original gold decoration, large cased thru-of-the-century bitters or barber bottle; Neal Skibinski—Fostoria bitters bottle c. 1933-34; **Becky Slapper**, a guest—Duncan Canterbury ruby bowl with a bit of Amberina in the center due to being heat struck; L.G.Wright fairy lamp by Fenton; Celeste Sprague—Viking Epic heatstruck handkerchief vase c. 1950's-60's; Kirsten **Stensland**—L.G.Wright Moon & Stars comport and ruffled bowl by Fenton, Morgantown Crinkle tumblers pitcher & bowl (originally called El Mexicana, produced in opaque colors in the 1930's and then clear colors in the 1950's-60's); Cindy **Thomas**—Fenton Butterfly & Berry Carnival Glass swung vase; Florisa Trapp—cut central-European lamp with glass base.
