DICK TOWLE

Beloved PROG member Richard Douglas "Dick" Towle passed away August 9, 2012, from heart failure. He was immensely helpful to PROG, especially behind the scenes for the Show and Convention. Dick had a very witty sense of humor and a legion of friends who respected and adored him.

He was born in Minneapolis MN, but his family moved west and he graduated from Cleveland High School in 1945 and enlisted in the Navy. Following his military service, he graduated from the University of Washington in 1952.

Dick's career with Safeway Stores took his family to California, Hawaii and finally to Portland. He left Safeway in 1979 and began a successful venture in the floor covering industry.


In 1980 he met the love of his life, Gyrid Hyde. They married in 1982 and began their 30 years together filled with music, gardening, travel and community service. Dick and Gyrid were instrumental in bringing N.E. Portland's Columbia Children's Arboretum Park into being. They were recently honored with a placard soon to be installed in the Arboretum, and its two bridges will be officially named the Towle Bridges.

Dick is survived by his wife Gyrid; sister, Marion Harris; sons Terry (Jane) and Rob; daughter Nancy; stepchildren Celeste (Phil) Sprague, Keith (Helen) Hyde, and Ardis (Tom) Yingst; 11 grandchildren; six greatgrandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to the East Columbia Children's Arboretum through the Portland Parks Department. PROG will place a book in our library in Dick's name to honor his memory.


